RECIPE CORNER

This would have been a good recipe for Mardi Gras, but the brownie recipe won out for Valentine's day. Well, it is still good for chilly March weather.

I have made this with more chicken broth and eaten it as a soup. I did not use the okra, but substituted broccoli instead

The original recipe says 8 servings and has a notation of 190 calories per serving.

Gumbo

3 Tablespoons vegetable oil

1/4 cup flour

1 1/2 cups chopped onion

1 cup chopped celery

1 cup chopped green pepper

2 cloves garlic

3 cups chicken broth

1 16 ounce can tomatoes with juice

*1 10 ounce package frozen sliced okra (or broccoli)

1 bay leaf

1 teaspoon tabasco

3/4 pound cooked chicken shredded

*1/2 pound shelled and deveined shrimp

3 cups hot rice

In large pot, heat oil. Add the flour. Cook over low heat stirring frequently until dark brown. Add onion, celery, green pepper and garlic. Cook stirring often until vegetables are tender. Gradually stir in chicken broth until mixture is smooth. Stir in the tomatoes with juice, okra, bay leaf and tabasco. Bring to a boil, then add chicken and shrimp. Cook 3-5 minutes until shrimp have turned pink and cooked through. Discard bay leaf and serve over hot rice. Makes about 10 cups.

- * If using raw broccoli, it will need to be slightly pre-cooked.
- * I use pre-cooked shrimp.

It's been a while – think I will make a batch.

Greetings from Fortune Lake!

You have likely heard that we are moving forward with limited programming for Summer 2021. Our classic youth programs will be happening at half capacity. Our intergenerational programs have been adapted. Unfortunately, we need to pause Congregational Day Camps, Victory Camp, and Speciality Youth Camps for another season.

Online registrations opened on February 1, and registrations have been flowing in steadily. We have communicated with previous camper families via email encouraging them to visit fortunelake.org for a full description of the programs offered as well as our COVID-19-Policies. We want all participants to make informed decisions about their participation.

We opted not to print our large brochure. Instead, we have created the enclosed tri-fold to inform people of the 2021 program options and point them to our website. Each camper family and donor on our mailing list will receive this brochure in the mail. These additional copies are for you to distribute as you see fit. Perhaps there are new families in your congregation or community? Maybe your congregation has campership funds available, and you could reach out to a family from your local school district? Regardless, please share and invita. A personal invitation always has the most impact.

Here's a heads up on the three different types of programs offered; see fortunelake.org for full info:

- Our Youth Programs are filling guickly. If there are campers within your congregation who have not yet
 registered, please encourage them to do so soon. Unlike previous years, we anticipate that most—if not
 all—of our youth programs will be filled before the end of April.
- <u>Intergenerational Ala Carte Camp</u>: This all-inclusive program will most closely resemble Family Camp, Women & Kids Week, and Grandparents Camp. Families will lodge and eat together and participate in staff-led programs. It is a very vacation-y, faith-filled week to build memories!
- Staff Supported Rentals: In response to our congregation and camper survey, we are offering 3- and 5night rentals in August. Families and/or small groups will stay in the lodging of their choice, prepare their
 own meals, and set their own schedules (think of Airbnb Fortune Lake style). Staff will be available to
 provide hospitality. Ilfeguard, drive the pontoon boat, and meet guests' needs. If your congregation
 would like to talk about creative options for taking advantage of this safe vacation option, please let me
 know.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT
