

DEVOTION

What CAN'T you give up?

"Nothing shall separate us from the love of God. . . . " Romans 8:39

"What's one thing you can't give up?" the radio host asked. Listeners called in with some interesting (and unique) answers. Some mentioned their families. Others shared they couldn't give up on their dreams. All of us have something we treasure dearly---a person, a passion, a possession---something we just can't live without.

In the book of Hosea, God tells us that He won't give up on His chosen people Israel, His treasured possession. As Israel's loving husband, God provided her with everything the she needed: land, food, drink, clothing, and security. Yet, like an adulterous spouse, Israel rejected God and sought her happiness and security elsewhere. The more God pursued her, the further she drifted away (Hosea 11:2). However, though she hurt Him deeply, He would not give up on her. He would discipline her to redeem her; His desire was to re-establish His relationship with her.

Today, all of God's children can have the very same assurance: His love for us is a love that will never let us go (Romans 8:37-39). If we've wandered from Him, He yearns for us to return. When God disciplines us, we can be comforted that it is a sign of His pursuit, not His rejection. We are His treasure; He will never give up on us.

Heavenly Father, thank You for Your love that never gives up on me. Help me to love You with my whole heart. Amen.

RECIPE CORNER

Here's an old recipe I remember from being on the farm and we had plum trees. It's one of those I try to make at least once a year. You can substitute other fruit and it works really well with peaches.

Plum Kuchen

1 cup flour

4 Tbsp butter

4 Tbsp sugar

1 tsp salt

1 egg

¼ cup milk

1 ½ tsp baking powder

Plums or fruit of choice

Topping:

Mix together:

2 Tbsp flour

1 Tbsp butter

1 cup sugar


Mix dry ingredients, then mix egg and milk and combine with flour mixture.

Press dough into 9x9 pan.

Cut plums in half and place on dough, cut side up.

Sprinkle topping mixture over fruit.

Bake 30 minutes at 400°

LETTERS

The following is Bishop Katherine's response to Bill's earlier letter. It has been emailed to the "All Church" group and a copy of the letter is available on the table in the Narthex.

August 1, 2022

Dear Friends in Christ,

Grace and peace to you in these summer days!

Your Licensed Lay Minister, Bill Wendorf, sent me a copy of the letter he sent to you, in response to reactions of Shepherd of the Lakes to recent meetings and communications from the ELCA.

I was glad to be with you at the congregational meeting where there was discussion and decisions made regarding your financial partnership supporting ministry through the ELCA. As Bill states in his letter, this discussion was prompted by Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton's letter following the leaked Roe V. Wade decision. It is my understanding that her letter led to suspicion that the ELCA was financially supporting Planned Parenthood.

Bill's letter stated, "And not even our own Bishop Katherine could tell us definitely whether or not our funds were supporting such a controversial issue." And yet I can. The ELCA does NOT financially support Planned Parenthood. And I take exception to Bill's characterization of Bishop Eaton whom he wrote "pulled out the ELCA 1991 Social Statement on abortion, dusted it off and waived it in the face of the church."

The Social Statements of the ELCA are prayerfully considered within the context of scripture, the witness of Jesus, and in partnership with the whole church. Bishop Eaton did not "dust off" a statement that was no longer considered relevant. Rather these statements, given the intense, thorough, and prayerful preparation through which they are formed, continue to shape and inform the public voice of the ELCA in response to current events. These statements can be amended only through an action of the whole church at assembly.

Know that a desire for a social statement is proposed by a congregation, approved by a Synod assembly, and brought to the floor of churchwide assembly. If affirmed, the Church Council, made up of members from the synods (our own Bill Rice just completed his term), works to populate a new team to study the issue alongside scripture and develop a working draft of a statement. That draft then is published and the whole church is invited to study it and respond with comments, suggestions, and anything else they want to say. A final draft is then approved by the next Churchwide assembly. To learn more about the whole process and the reasons social statements are developed, I invite you to read the document at the link below. Our Social Statements are not mandates. They are meant to guide the discernment of all church members as together we struggle to be faithful in the midst of complex social issues.

I also take exception to the phrase, "we don't work for the ELCA, they work for us." I believe this statement misses the point of ministry. We are partners together. Bill partners with SOTL and SOTL partners with Bill, congregations partner together grouped as conferences who make up a synod. With 65 synods, the church has a bigger, louder voice and influence for the work of Christ than any one of us alone. It is not an employee/employer situation. It is more like a marriage, with mutual accountability.

I remember the first time going to a churchwide meeting. I learned all the different ways that the church, MY church, is making a difference in the world. I was proud to be a part of an organization that advocates for the oppressed, gives voice to the voiceless, feeds the hungry, and lobbies lawmakers to remember the poor.

In Bill's letter, I hear a desire to avoid conflict presumably caused by differing political views. Certainly, it is appropriate that congregation members do not impose a partisan opinion on each other or from the pulpit. As you know, the division of church and state is meant to keep the government from having influence in the church. Likewise, government is needed to defend the rights of all faiths, or no faith, to find expression. We are blessed to live in a country where we can gather without fear of government intervention. But our faith is meant to influence how we approach politics, just as it is meant to shape every aspect of our lives, in and out of the congregation. We are meant to look at our laws, policies, candidates and more through the eyes and the witness of Jesus the Christ. Our faith should come with us into the voting booth, no matter what our political stripe. Our faith prompts us to sign petitions and think critically about how laws can be improved to serve all people more effectively. It motivates us to support or reject a given candidate as we do the work of weighing that person's platform against the metric of the gospel message. The community of faith is where we can disagree about these things, and much more, with mutual respect and civil discourse that can lead to deeper understanding. There is much more that can be said about all of these very complex issues. My reasons for writing this letter are motivated by the following:

- We do not all need to agree in order to partner together for the work of Christ, for mission, and ministry.
- I appreciate Bill's leadership and the gifts for ministry that he brings to our work together.
- The complexities of abortion, faith, politics, and more cannot be unpacked in a single letter or explored thoroughly in one conversation, especially when they are so emotionally charged.
- I deeply value the partnership of Shepherd of the Lakes and your heartfelt discernment concerning your own investment in mission. I am grateful for your financial support of the ministry of the whole Northern Great Lakes Synod.

Please know that I am available for further conversation, and I look forward to worshipping with you again in the future.
