Loving Like Jesus


I John 3:18 "Children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and truth."

While waiting for a train at a station in Atlanta, Georgia, a young man wearing dress pants and a button-down shirt sat on a bench. As he struggled with his tie, an older woman encouraged her husband to help. When the elderly gentleman hunched over and began teaching the young man how to knot the tie, a stranger took a photo of the trio. When this photo went viral online, many viewers left comments about the power of such random acts of kindness.

For believers in Jesus, kindness to others reflects the self-sacrificing care that He showed for people like us. It's an expression of God's love and what He desired His disciples to live out: "We should love one another." John equates hating a brother or sister to murder. 
Loving Father, please help me see with a heart ready to show selfless love wherever You send me. Amen.

NALC Disaster Response

"North American Lutheran Church"

Greetings in the name of our Lord from NALC Disaster Response!

NALC Disaster Response was formed to provide support for you and your congregation when disasters strike. And disasters continue to happen throughout the United States.

NALC Disaster Response has responded to disasters from California wildfires to Florida hurricanes to Maui wildfires. The annual report of NALC Disaster Response is available on the website at www.thenalc.org/disaster.

We are currently in long term recovery for the California wildfires, eastern Kentucky flooding and Hurricane Idalia in Perry, FL. Volunteers are needed to help rebuild the homes destroyed by these disasters.

When the National Disaster Task Force met in 2023, new goals were set to help serve in each Mission District:

- 1. Engage youth and more adults in serving to the glory of God and sharing the love of Jesus
- 2. Provide disaster preparedness training for each mission district
- 3. Build a Youth & Adult Volunteer training and retreat center at the National warehouse in Caldwell OH
- 4. Engage more Spiritual Christian Care volunteers and promote Life To Life Discipleship
- 5. Provide information about NALC Disaster Response for new congregations and new pastors
- 6. Schedule "Stuff the Trucks" in each Mission District, with support from Women of the NALC. Warehouses need to be filled with emergency relief supplies: Bibles, flood buckets, health kits, quilts, school kits, and baby supplies. This helps us to load and go when disasters strike!

Thank you for serving and being the hands and feet of Jesus when families lose everything in a disaster – thank you for sharing the Hope of Jesus!

Also available are individual sheets which outline our donations management and our volunteer needs – there were so many disasters each year and we serve through all of them with your help and support! Check out our new Spiritual Christian care training program at www.thenalc.org/disaster.

WELCOME TO THE NORTH AMERICAN LUTHERAN CHURCH

We hope the following information will be helpful as you make the transition to the NALC. Our denomination is, "A renewed Lutheran community moving forward in faith, the NALC is focused on living out Christ's Great Commission to go and make disciples in North America and around the globe."

The four Core Values of the NALC guide the mission and ministry of the church and each of its congregations. These Core Values are something we turn to regularly as we listen for the Holy Spirit's guidance. The following are some ways in which we encourage all congregations of the NALC to pray about and consider how they might inform and shape the local parish's ministry.

CHRIST CENTERED

We confess the apostolic faith in Jesus Christ according to the Holy Scriptures. We affirm the authority of the Scriptures as the authoritative source and norm, "according to which all doctrines should and must be judged" (Formula of Concord). We accept the ecumenical creeds and the Lutheran Confessions as true witnesses to the Word of God.

Focusing our communal and personal lives on Christ as the center of all we do and all we are keeps us listening for God's guidance in our worship, service, fellowship, and vision. Christ is the head of the Church which is the Body of Christ. As St. Paul wrote, "And {Christ} is the head of the body, the church. He is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, that in everything he might be preeminent" (Colossians 1:18 ESV).

MISSION DRIVEN

We believe that the mission of the Church is to preach the Gospel and to make disciples for Christ. We believe that making disciples — in our congregations, in our communities and nations, and around the world — must be a priority of the Church in the present age.

The Great Commission (Matthew 28:19-20) guides our work together in Christ. The NALC is committed to making disciples of all nations, beginning with our congregations, and spreading around the world. We have a major focus on discipleship called "Life-to-Life." It is an intense spiritual process that multiplies disciple making through one-to-one coaching relationships.

We also have a strong focus on congregational renewal with the "Fresh Eyes for Mission Summit" that helps congregations examine missional capacity in their context, setting a clear path forward into God's intended future for their ministry. International missions are also at the heart of the NALC, and we are full communion partners with the Ethiopian Evangelical Church Mekane Yesus (EECMY), and have a Memorandum of Understanding with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania.

All congregations of the NALC are encouraged to engage in relationship with a local mission (i.e., a house church or mission start), a North American mission and a global mission. Ideas for national and global mission partnerships can be found on our website, <u>thenalc.org</u>.



CONGREGATIONALLY FOCUSED

We affirm the ecumenical creeds and the faithful witness of the Church across time and space. We endorse the form and practices of the universal Church that are consistent with Scripture, particularly the office of the ministry and the tradition of worship under Word and Sacrament. We seek dialogue and fellowship with other Lutheran churches and with faithful Christians of other confessions.

In the NALC the ministry of the local congregation is of the utmost importance. The Gospel is preached and lived out in the local parish and the context in which each parish lives and serves. Each member congregation has a say in the governance of the larger church, with a congregational ratification process being required for changes to constitution or church teaching. This ensures that local parishes are equally represented in the decision making of the NALC and represent an important safeguard for the future!

TRADITIONALLY GROUNDED

We strive to be a church that is organized to facilitate the ministries of local congregations in a posture of servanthood and a spirit of partnership, through the provision of resources, connections and information.

To be traditionally grounded is to be confessional and orthodox in doctrine and faith by passing on what has been entrusted to the Church of Christ since the time of the apostles. It does not mean we elevate human traditions. On the contrary. Churches of the NALC are steeped in the Word of God, trusting it to be the source and norm for our faith. We also hold to the unaltered Augsburg Confession, the Small and Large Catechisms as sources that point us to Christ.

The church is countercultural adhering to God's Word and trusting what we hear and learn in the Holy Scriptures is inspired by the Holy Spirit. We are a sacramental church who believes that Jesus is fully present in, with and under the forms of bread and wine in Holy Communion, and that Baptism unites us with Christ's death and resurrection, granting us new life and hope which is integral to our daily living as disciples and followers of Jesus!

Structure of Leadership

The structure of leadership in the NALC is not a top-heavy, hierarchical organization. We describe our structure as "lean," adding staff and organization only when necessary to fulfill our mission and ministry. There is an elected eight-member Executive Council that is the governing body of the church. The bishop is the CEO of the church, the chief shepherd to whom is entrusted care of the congregations and pastors of the church, while keeping the vision of the Great Commission before us as chief evangelist.

The bishop is responsible to the Executive Council and the NALC in convocation, and together, we are all under the authority and headship of Jesus Christ, Lord of the Church. The general secretary is the COO of the church and oversees the day-to-day operations of the church. There are also assistants to the bishop who specialize in mission, ministry, ecumenical relations, and communications.

The church is divided into mission districts which are led by an elected pastor who serves as the dean. There are currently 35 mission districts and 35 mission district deans. An image of the boundaries of each mission district and the congregations therein can be seen on the website. These smaller geographic units allow for congregations and pastors to engage in mission together and support one another.

Committees and Task Forces

There are numerous committees, teams, and task forces that help mobilize the mission and ministry of the North American Lutheran Church:

- **-WNALC** Women of the North American Lutheran Church is the women's organization. There is a governing board that oversees and equips women's ministries in the congregations.
- **—Candidacy Committee** Oversees the formation of students preparing for Word and Sacrament Ministry and Lay Ministry.

- -Candidacy Committee Oversees the formation of students preparing for Word and Sacrament Ministry and Lay Ministry.
- **—Board of Regents** —The governing body that oversees the NALC's seminary, The North American Lutheran Seminary at Trinity School for Ministry, Ambridge, PA.
- **−NALC Disaster Response Team** − A team that quickly mobilizes for action in the face of disasters.
- —The Great Commission Society A team of mission driven people who do the vetting of ministry partners and helps congregations engage in mission at all levels (local, national, global).
- **—Living and Giving Stewardship Team** A team of passionate pastors and lay people who care about the stewardship of God's gifts of time, talent, treasure, and thanksgiving. You can find multiple stewardship studies on the website that have been written by the team.
- **-Youth & Family Ministry Team** A team of people who are passionate about making disciples of our youngest generations using *faithwebbing* youth ministry resources, as well as coaching, equipping and creating resources for churches.
- **–Commission on Theology and Doctrine** This group of pastors and theologians provide advice and counsel to the NALC bishop with regard to the biblical, confessional and doctrinal teachings of the church in matters of life and faith. The NALC also sponsors a Young Theologians group which meets annually in conjunction with our annual Lutheran Week as we are committed to raising up the next generation of teaching theologians in the church.
- —Ministry Partners As mentioned above, there are numerous ministries vetted, endorsed, and supported by the NALC.

RECIPE CORNER

This recipe was taken from a cookbook created by the three local Catholic Churches in the area – St. Mary's, St. Anne's and St. Rita's.

Norwegian Lefse

Recipe from Agnes Ritzke

1 Cup cooked, riced or mashed, potatoes ½ Cup melted lard

3/4 Cup Flour

½ tsp. salt

Add melted lard to potatoes while warm. Cool, then add flour and salt, stirring until well mixed. Make balls about 1 inch in diameter. Chill at least two hours before rolling with grooved lefse pin. Bake on grill or flat surface of cook stove. Makes about 10 - 12 lefse.
