# **UPDATE ON CHURCH SERVICES**

It was determined at the regularly scheduled Council Meeting on May 21, 2020 to move our primary worship service to Saturdays at 5:30 p.m. for the foreseeable future. There are several reasons for this decision which include the greater ease of attending a Saturday service during the summer for many people and the ability to record and post the worship service to the Church website for Sunday morning viewing.

All of the CDC guidelines for Covid-19 have been taken into account when determining the maximum number of people the sanctuary can hold for a service including social distancing and sanitization. The maximum number for safety is 40 - 45 people.

When we reach that number at the Saturday service, we will begin holding a second service on Sunday morning at 9:00 am. When a Saturday service has 40-45 people attending, an email will be sent to all that we have email addresses for to notify you of the second service scheduling.

### **CHURCH COUNCIL SUMMARY**

Church Council met on Wednesday, May 21, 2020. The highlights of the meeting are as follows:

- Bags of food are available for anyone who needs them.
- We are continuing to learn the technology we need to put the services online. Services will be recorded for the foreseeable future.
- The church is sanitized weekly before services.
- Text Study and the Quilting Group are once again meeting as scheduled.
- Primary Worship service has been moved to Saturday at 5:30 p.m.
- Beth Von Ende is available as our musician until this fall.
- Financial reports through March were presented. Financially we are doing well.
- South Building Entry addition blueprints have been approved. Plans need to be submitted to a state certified architect and approved by Madison. The contractor, Mike Everson, will be submitting a final bid when material costs are determined. At that time the congregation will be contacted, likely by mail if our Constitution allows that method, and asked for their permission to proceed. The contractor hopes to begin in July.
- The portico was once again damaged by a drive through vehicle. The driver's insurance has been contacted. Discussion of how to prevent these events resulted in the determination to attach plastic chains to each set of stone pillars by the front door and to place "No Turn Around" or "Private Property" signs at either end of the drive.
- Roofing of the pavilion will be done this summer.
- Summer events will be cancelled. These include Pie & Ice Cream Social, 4<sup>th</sup> of July Popcorn Event, Brett & Frisk Concert, and most likely October Fest.

The minutes for the June 17, 2020 Council Meeting have not yet been approved.

The next Council Meeting will be Wednesday, July 22, 2020 at 6:00 p.m. All are welcome to attend.

# **DEVOTIONS**

Every Story

Luke 24:27: Beginning with Moses and all the prophets, He explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning Himself."

I opened the whimsically-illustrated children's Bible and began to read it to my grandson. Immediately we were enthralled as the story of God's love and provision was shown in prose. Marking our place, I turned the book over and read the title once again: The Jesus Storybook: Every Story Whispers His name.

Every story whispers His name.

To be honest, sometimes the Bible, especially the Old Testament, is hard to understand. Why do those who don't know God seem to triumph over God's own? How can God permit such cruelty when we know that His character is pure and that His purposes are for our good?

After His resurrection, Jesus met two of His followers on the road to Emmaus who didn't recognize Him and were struggling with disappointment over the death of their hoped-for Messiah. They had "hoped that He was the One Who was going to redeem Israel. Luke then records how Jesus reassured them: "Beginning with Moses and all the prophets, He (Jesus) explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning Himself."

Every story whispers His name, even the hard stories, because they reveal the complete brokenness of our world and our need for a Rescuer. Every act, every event, every intervention points to the redemption God Himself designed for His wayward loved ones: to bring us back to Himself.

Dear Father, help me to listen as You whisper Your name through the stories of Scripture...every story. Amen.


### PRAYER REQUESTS

### RECIPE CORNER

This recipe can be made with fresh or frozen strawberries, but the fresh tastes best. I have a grandson with a 4th of July birthday. When they were visiting one summer at that time I made this and it is now his request each year for his birthday. That also meant his mother had to learn to make it! When the July newsletter comes out it should be just about right for strawberry season. The nice part is, it is a frozen dessert so can be made, frozen and be ready to serve anytime.

Frosty Strawberry Squares

1 cup flour 1/4 cup brown sugar 1/2 cup walnuts chopped 1/2 cup butter

2 egg whites

1 cup sugar, 2/3 cup if using frozen berries

2 cups strawberries, fresh or frozen – if frozen, 10 oz partially thawed

2 Tablespoon lemon juice

1 cup whipping cream

Mix together flour and brown sugar, cut in butter, and walnuts.

Spread into 9X13 pan

Bake @ 350 for 20 minutes, stirring several times. (I bake in 7 minute increments)

Cool – remove some of crust crumbs for garnishing top.

- \*In large bowl combine egg whites, sugar, berries and lemon juice.
- \*Whip at high speed until soft peaks form (about 10 minutes)

7-8 minutes usually does it.

\*Fold in Whipped cream

Spread onto crumb crust and sprinkle with reserved crumbs.

Cover and freeze at least 6 hours.

Notes: I cut the sugar by about 1/4 cup.

\*Cut the strawberries small or crush, otherwise when the beaters hit them you will have strawberry-sprinkled walls.

I also use Cool Whip instead of whipped cream – about 2 cups.

### CHILDRENS CORNER

Science Experiment How cold and heat work together

The Bible says that God would rather we be hot or cold than lukewarm. He wants us to be hot as the summer sun or cold as the ice we use to cool ourselves. Being hot or cold helps us share the love of Jesus in a world that tends to be lukewarm, as this mini-message and demonstration show.

Materials: large glass bowl or container, water, 12-inch piece of string, salt, spoon, ice

### **Instructions:**

- 1. Fill the bowl with water.
- 2. Drop some ice cubes in the water,
- 3. Try to pick up the ice using only the string.
- 4. Then lay the string over the ice cubes and spoon some salt over the top.
- 5. Pull on the string. (The ice should be stuck to it and lift out of the water.


**Explanation:** Salt lowers the freezing point of water. When we poured the salt over the ice cube, it lowered the melting point of the ice. The salt melted a thin layer of the ice cube. Then the water cooled very quickly and re-froze, making the string freeze to the ice cube.

What does this mean? Sometimes it can seem like some people will never believe Jesus is God's Son and our Savior. Our friends who seem "too tough" for Jesus are like the ice cubes. The string is faith. It can seem like the two will never stick together. But if you add some prayer – the salt – you can see even the coldest person be lifted up to Jesus. In the heat of summer, let's remember to be salt; let's pray for people to be "caught up" by Jesus!

### Game

### **Not-So-Straight Obstacle Race**

Students will complete a silly obstacle course where, instead of running straight to the finish line, they will have to hop, skip, jump, and do whatever else the course tells them! As they lose the simple freedom of running to the end, they will be reminded (by adult present, of course) to appreciate what freedoms they have today.

Materials: sidewalk chalk

<u>Objective</u>: Get through the obstacle course the fastest.

<u>Preparation</u>: This game is best played outdoors. In a large area, make an obstacle course with sidewalk chalk. Draw a long squiggly line, a hopscotch court, circles, and anything else you can think of to keep students on course. Make sure the course twists and turns and is definitely NOT in a straight line.

<u>Introduction</u>: "As we celebrate the Fourth of July, we are reminded that freedom is a gift. Today we are going to play a game that will help us remember our freedom with thanksgiving.

### Instructions

- 1. Explain what each part of the obstacle course means (i.e., students may not take their feet off the squiggle line. They must hop from one circle to the next. They must skip on the dotted line, etc.) Choose one child to start.
- 2. If they mess up, they must go back to the beginning and start over.
- 3. Time the child.
- 4. Repeat until everyone has had a chance to go.
- 5. The student with the fastest time wins.

Mention to children once the obstacle course is finished: Freedom in America was not a sure-shot, was not a straight line of fighting and winning from start to finish. It was a little like this obstacle course. Sometimes the freedom fighters did not know if they would get out of the complicated messes that are found in war! Let's be grateful for our freedom today! Though it's harder, celebrate by making a good choice that helps someone else today, even though you are free not to do that.
