CHRISTMAS LETTER

Pastor Paul Otto was my friend, mentor, and uncle by marriage. He once told me a story of an experience he had while attending seminary. He shared that he had one instructor that started class each day with prayer (as all did) giving thanks for something different each day. Well one day, while experiencing a winter storm (the kind for which we have experienced in recent weeks), only Paul and two other classmates could make it to class that day. As they waited for their instructor to arrive, they asked one another what he might give thanks for on such a day as this. As the instructor entered the room, he looked at those in attendance and said, "Let us Pray", Heavenly Father, we give you thanks that not every day is like today, Amen!

For most in ancient times, it was hard to find much of anything to be thankful for. Being passed on through the centuries from one oppressor to another, waiting for the promised Messiah that would liberate them, but had yet to come. Their world was dark and heavily burdened. In their mind not much, if anything, to be thankful for. But as always, God had other plans. At a time when some had thought God had forgotten them, God was making ready to fulfill his promise, to shed light on, and in, the darkness of their hearts, to ease their burden, and to give a sure and certain hope to them and us.

On a cold winter night long ago, in a lowly stable, quietly, humbly, a baby is born, a Son is given, and the world is changed forever. "For unto you is born this day in the city of David, a Savior, who is Christ the Lord". This child fulfills God's promise of a Savior for all mankind. Hope once again is in the world, "The light shining in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it". God's great gift, the greatest gift ever given, given for all, that all may live in and through the light of the newborn Christ child. Living in his love, peace, and the hope that he brings.

But the darkness still tries to overtake us. The weight of the world around us squeezes in to try and push the light out, and we may find it hard at times to think of something, anything, to be thankful for. But like Uncle Paul's instructor who found something to be thankful for even on the hardest of days, we need only look once more in that lowly stable, to a manger where a baby wrapped in swaddling clothes lie, where two faithful and obedient parents looked on with wonder, and give thanks to God for this great and wonderful gift.

Everlasting Hope by Karen Carter

Psalm 146:5 "Blessed are those whose god is the God of Jacob, whose hope is in the Lord their God."

The week before Christmas, two months after my dear mother-in-law died, holiday shopping and treedecorating were at the bottom of my priority list. I resisted my husband's attempts to comfort me as I grieved the loss of our family's matriarch and a very close friend to me. I sulked as our son stretched out and ringed the tree with little white lights. Without a word, he plugged them in as he and his dad left for the mall. As the tiny white lights blinked, God gently drew me out of my darkness. No matter the circumstances, they reminded me that my hope remained secure in the light of God's truth, which always reveals His unchanging character.

Psalm 146 reaffirms what God reminded me on that difficult morning. My endless hope is in the Lord: "The Lord lifts up those who are bowed down." He "watches over us, sustains us" and will always be Lord and King.

Sometimes, when Christmas rolls around, our days will overflow with joyful moments. Sometimes, though, we will face loss, experience hurt, or feel very much alone. But, at all times, God has promised to be our Light in the darkness, offering us tangible help and everlasting love. I know this to be true.

Heavenly Father, thank You for inviting us to know and to rely on Your unchanging character as the source of our eternal hope.

FARMER'S ALMANAC

From the Old Farmer's Almanac, here is a little bit about the history of Christmas traditions in America from Christmas trees to greeting cards.

Christmas trees

The first American Christmas tree can be credited to a Hessian soldier by the name of Henrick Roddmore, who was captured at the battle of Bennington in 1776. He then went to work on the farm of Samuel Denslow in Windsor Locks, Connecticut, where for the next 14 years he put up and decorated Christmas trees in the Denslow family home. (I have a sneaking hunch that a whole bunch of German settlers did that very thing way before Henrick.)

The first retail Christmas tree lot was established in 1851 by a Pennsylvanian named Mark Carr, who hauled two ox sleds loaded with Christmas trees from the Catskill Mountains to the sidewalks of New York City.

The first president to set up a Christmas tree in the White House was Franklin Pierce, and the first president to establish the National Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony on the White House lawn was Calvin Coolidge.

In 1882, the first Christmas tree lights were sold in New York City.

Christmas cards

The first American to print and sell Christmas cards was Louis Prang of Roxbury, Massachusetts, who began publishing cards in 1875.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower is given credit for sending the first "official" Christmas card from the White House. An art print also became the standard Christmas gift for the president's staff, a practice continued to this day.

RECIPE CORNER

"Years ago the Milwaukee Journal/Sentinel had a recipe column "You Asked For It" (maybe they still do). If you had a dish at a restaurant and wanted the recipe, they would attempt to obtain it for you. This one was requested from Oneida Village Inn, Three Lakes. With winter full upon us, it seems like a good fit.

Oneida Village Inn, Zuppa Italiano

*2 pounds spicy precooked Italian sausage
2 medium onions, chopped
1 medium green bell pepper, chopped
2 Tablespoons minced garlic
Olive oil to cook vegetables
4 cups chopped Roma tomatoes with juice (canned can be used)
5 cups beef stock or au jus
3/4 cup burgundy wine
3/4 teaspoon diced basil or 1 teaspoon pesto
1/4 teaspoon dried oregano
2 medium zucchini, sliced (optional)
*2 cups shell macaroni noodles
salt and pepper to taste
1/2 cup parsley to garnish
1/2 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese

Dear God, We had a good time at church today...wish you could have been there. Matthew (age 7) Slice sausage 3/4 inch thick, set aside Saute onion, pepper and garlic in olive oil until limp, about 5 minutes. Add tomatoes with liquid, beef stock, wine, basil, oregano, and sausage. Simmer 20 minutes. Add zucchini and noodles. Cook until noodles are tender. Soup will be thick. Season, sprinkle with parsley; serve with cheese.

*I do not use sausages, but rather brown 2 pounds bulk Italian flavored pork sausage. If you use 2 cups of macaroni, it ends up more like a hot dish. I usually make it with 1 cup macaroni. If summer, I might use the zucchini, but it gets pretty limp if you don't eat it all right away.
